This project, funded by Minerva SAFE Manitoba, involved the development of a one day training course to introduce the core concepts of occupational health and safety to apprentices, including rights, responsibilities, basic personal protective equipment, WHMIS, electrical safety, etc. The Manitoba Apprenticeship Board has made this a mandatory part of each first year apprentice's learning outcomes. Instructors deliver the training as they wish but guidance and materials are provided. Safe Manitoba conducts workshops for apprenticeship instructors to enable them to deliver the Trade Safety Awareness themselves. The program consists of nine lessons, based on a combination of group work, hands-on exercises and demonstrations, videos and lectures.
